Review of Pupil Premium Forecast Report 2017-18

Introduction

What is the Pupil Premium Grant?

The Pupil Premium Grant is additional funding given to publicly-funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and to close the gap between them and their peers.

The funding is available to both mainstream and non-mainstream schools such as special schools and pupil referral units.

Who is the Pupil Premium Grant for?

The Pupil Premium is primarily aimed at Reception to Year 11 pupils who are from low-income families and are eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) or who have been registered for FSM at any point in the past six years.

How much is the Pupil Premium Grant Currently?

For the 2017-18 financial years, the allocation is as follows:

1. £1,320 per child currently eligible for FSM or who has been registered for FSM in the past six vears

Schools will also receive £1,900 for each looked-after pupil who:

- 3. Has been looked after from one day or more (3 currently at St Antony's for whom we are currently seeking funding)
- 4. Was adopted from care on or after 30 December 2005 or left care under a Special Guardian Order or a Residence Order (none currently at St Antony's)

Our pupils performed significantly above National Standards overall with an Average Scaled Score of 114.0 (FFT &ROL 2017) as against the national average which was 104. This placed us in the top FFT ranking of #1% in the country.	98% of pupils overall attained an average scaled score of 110 or higher in reading, writing and maths against National which was approximately 61% again placing us in the top ranking of #1. (FFT &ROL 2017)	

Additional Impact Of Investment Using Our Pupil Premium Grant (as well as staff commitment)

St. Antony's was highlighted as the top school in the borough for Achievement and Attainment in SATS 2017 (Evening Standard December 2017). This also placed the school amongst the top 3 % of schools nationally for pupil progress (letter from the office of the Minister of State for Education Nick Gibb -February 2017). The school's average progress level in Reading, Writing and Maths is significantly above the National Average. Additionally, the school scored significantly higher than National Standard in terms of progress at both expected and greater depth (exceeding).

*It must be noted that while we enjoyed a high level of funding for pupil premium in former academic years since 2014 we have seen a serious shortfall in funding year on year-particularly this academic year as the number of pupils qualifying for this funding has decreased drastically over the last 3 years and we anticipate that we will possibly only be able to secure funding for approximately 54 pupils for this year. Additionally, not all parents eligible have signed up with the DfE process for the school to access these funds due to a range of mitigating circumstances.
